Former Campers' Hope Restored

"Joshua kept cougars from invading our camp. And once he woke me during a storm to warn us of impending floodwaters." Lori says of her 14-year-old son. "My husband had to ride his bicycle thirteen miles to town to get supplies and look for a job.

"Camping for five months while homeless was so hard, but such a bonding time for my husband, our son and myself," continues Lori, a pert, petite blonde. "We're grateful for the experience."

Rob tells of the many kind people along the way – firefighters, camp hosts, other campers – all a part of God's provision in a tough time. In a desperate hour, a church group camping nearby gave the family a cash donation. The group also left them food and firewood.

"Miracles happened in His provisions, in relationships and protection. Our needs were met. Our faith in God got stronger and our family got closer. But 'nothing changes if nothing changes'," Rob observes. "We were living one day at a time, but nothing was moving us forward."

Then a niece mentioned she knew someone who had benefited during a stay at My Father's House and recommended the shelter as a possibility.

"When we let go of the steering wheel, God took over," quotes Rob in one of his many colorful maxims. They arrived at MFH eager and ready for the next phase God had in store for the family.

"We absolutely love the staff. They're amazing. They lift us up and are so encouraging and accepting. The classes, the whole program – just what we needed when

we needed it!" says Lori.

"We especially enjoy Dave Ramsey's *Financial Freedom*. We are putting many of the principles into action already."

"We love that N.A. [narcotics anonymous] has an open meeting here. The Parenting Class and Ready-to-Rent were great,"
Rob says as Lori agrees. They also

appreciate the planned activities like Family Night every Saturday night.

Their son, Joshua, says that Sunday Night Youth Group is his favorite part of MFH, "next to our room, of course, having our own space. That's the best ever."

Soon after arriving, Lori did a ninth step in her recovery. "I was just doing what was right and I got hired," Lori shares. Lori got a job as a deli clerk, a job she

knows, with people she knows and enjoys. She plans to return to school next

year and major in counseling.

Rob, a business manager by trade, recently accepted a security guard position at the Rose Garden. "I get to watch the Trailblazers while I get paid! Does it get any better than that?" Rob exclaims.

The most significant changes in their lives as MFH residents are not in the realm of jobs or housing, although these are major goals for all residents. "It's about hope restored," Rob states confidently. "And for me," adds Lori, "it's been about discovering my spiritual strength."

"MFH is so much more than a shelter," Lori says thoughtfully. "Yeah," agrees Rob, "it's like a key to independence for us. It's not a hand-out, it's a hand-up."

December is quickly approaching, and our goal is to have My Father's House completely filled by Christmas. But we simply can't do it without you. We still have seven rooms that need to be adopted out. Here's what's involved:


Our Adopt-A-Room program is a one-year commitment. You will be responsible for furnishing your room three to four times a year. When families move into My Father's House we want them to feel welcome. Providing the new, needed items is a wonderful way to show them we care. When a family leaves the shelter to set up their own apartment, they take all the items with them to help them with their fresh start. Furniture items do not have to be replaced because they are permanent in the apartment rooms. The average cost for these items is \$300-\$500 depending on your shopping style and the size of family moving in. The room you adopt will have a plaque on the wall outside the room honoring you, your family, church or
